Success for All Schools in New York City Gain on ELA

New York City's Success for All elementary schools have shown greater gains than other New York City or New York State elementary schools over the past 2 years on the state's main accountability measure for reading, the New York State English Language Arts (ELA) exams. **From 2000 to 2002, 4th graders in New York City's 56 Success for All schools gained an average of 6.4 percentage points in scoring proficient or better (levels 3 or 4) on the ELA.** New York City as a whole rose 4.8 percentage points, and the state gained 2.8 percentage points.

Schools making particularly outstanding gains include the following:

- PS 212X in the Bronx gained 31%.
- PS 3X in the Bronx gained 24%.
- PS 64M in Manhattan gained 21%.
- PS 65X in the Bronx gained 19%.
- PS 196X in the Bronx gained 19%.
- PS 145K in Brooklyn gained 18%.

The 2002 results reflect findings in New York and in many other cities and states, affirming that students in Success for All schools gain more than other students on state accountability measures.
